



Seymour Library opened in its new location, the Case Memorial Building, in 1903.







TRAINS & TROLLEYS

Connected internally and externally by a network of railroad and trolley lines. Five railroads handled approximately 90,000 carloads of freight yearly.

NEWS & INDUSTRY

- 6 newspapers (2 dailies; 4 weekly/semiweekly), 2 telegraph companies, and 2 telephone companies.
- Water power and low electric/gas rates attracted manufacturers to the area.
- International Harvester employed 3,000 people in its various departments. Dunn and McCarthy produced shoes.Nye and Waite manufactured carpets and rugs on 150 looms. And Columbian Rope – employing 1,000 – imported a hundred freight car-loads of raw materials every 2 - 3 weeks and shipped its finished product throughout the world.

A growing immigrant population

The 1910 Auburn City Directory included separate sections for residents from Austria, Poland, and Italy. The school district's evening school focused on the study of English and 15 nationalities were represented in its enrollment with many employed by the manufacturers mentioned.



Challenges

AND HOW TO FACE THEM

Volunteer schedules. Everyone works at different paces and their lives can get busy. To keep things moving, continue training new volunteers, be prepared for down periods, and pivot when needed (online training as well as in-person).

Time. This can be a big investment for those overseeing the project and volunteers. Allow for breaks and focus on what you can.

Your Community. We have an elder population that sometimes struggles with technology. See if you can provide a safe space for group work and be prepared to help to build confidence.

Communication. There may be times when you reach out to volunteers and not hear back. Push forward, try finding new volunteers and circle back to the missing volunteer at a future date. Do they need more training or assistance? Do they lack the time to do the work?

Adding photographs & images to HistoryForge

The collaborations from the advisory committee lead to this subproject, which was our first step in adding photographs and other images to the Forge.

- The images (postcards, stereocards, black and white photographs, and color photographs) were selected from the collections of Seymour Library and the Cayuga County Historian and reflected the diversity of Auburn's residents and neighborhoods.
- Funded through a grant from the South Central Regional Library Council's Technology and Digitization Grants.
- Through this project we added 600 images of people and residences to Auburn HistoryForge.
- We look forward to future expansion of the visual aspects of Auburn HistoryForge.

- we have trained 21 transcribers to date, which has allowed us to continue the project while allowing the transcribers to take breaks as their schedules filled with other life duties.
- Allows for historians to see Auburn from different sides. Where were people living and working? Where were the immigrant populations living? Which countries were they from at the time? It also shows the ethnic population divides throughout the city and how that has influenced the Auburn of today.

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


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A Section of History PARKER STREET

- Parker Street features a range of diversity that represents Auburn.
- We are using it as a sample of the range of information that can be added to HistoryForge.
- During the spring of 2021, an intern from Syracuse University assisted us with transcribing the 1900 census information for Parker Street and building survey information on the houses.
- We plan to add other census years, newspaper articles, city directory information, and other resources – perhaps even oral histories – to further detail this street in the future through internships or volunteer hours.

POTENTIAL TOPICS FOR RESEARCH



What's going on down on Water street?





A massive fire sadly overtook the historic knitting mill building on December 5th in Elmira Heights. The warehouse was once a thriving knitting mill. The mill began making wool, cotton and silk goods in 1895 and employed hundreds of people over its 60 plus years.

This spurred our interest in what we could find on Elmira HistoryForge that connected to the knitting mill. We search under the "Industry" filter for "knitting mill" employees in the 1910 census, and here is what we found:

Of the currently entered 16,000 records from Elmira's 1910 census, our search filter revealed 130 people working for knitting mills with over 30 different job descriptions. A few of the job descriptions were knitters, spinners, shipping clerks, finishers, folders, packers, taggers, bleachers, stenographer and bookkeepers. These workers ranged from age 14 to 62 with over 75% of them being female. I found that many of the younger 14- to 17-year-olds that were working at such an early age had parents and siblings working along with them.

Our 1910 Census shows Daniel Kennedy, President of Kennedy Valve Co, and his family lived in the mansion. From the census we can see he and his wife are Irish immigrants, and their sons Matthew and Daniel are employed in the family business. The Kennedy family and their descendants lived and raised their family there until 1958.

The members of the St. Peter's Club, which includes the whole of Roman Clerical Society, as is their custom, resented the pope a magnificent basket of the most carefully selected fruits and lowers, representing the form of a Venetian gondola. The pope, in thankng the givers, made a most touching efference to "his beloved Venice," addng: "I pray I shall prove a good helmsman for the bark of St. Peter."



Elmira HistoryForge was recently questioned about a backyard find. One of our readers found what he believed to be a hitching post in his backyard.

With a little digging we were able to confirm that what he found is indeed a step and hitching post combination made here in Elmira.

The step and hitching post was designed and patent May 24, 1871 by Morgan Dyer. Dyer was the manufacturer of agricultural implements as well as more decorative cast iron items. He held a patent for a scraper plow, and a shared patent under Dyer and Bratt for an iron fence pattern that he produced here in Elmira.

the time Mr. Holden purchased the Railroad avenue property, the abutting lot towards Water street, the corner, was occupied by an old shack of a building once a prosperous foundry and shop for the manufacture of agricultural implements, known as Dyer's foundry. Later, Morgan Dyer had a one-story brick foundry that extended from Exchange place to the canal on Market street, occupying the lot, though not the entire width, now the home of the big dry goods business of N. J. Thompson & Company. It is well remembered yet, how the sky for blocks around was illuminated when, at night, they were "casting in Dyer's foundry."



George W. Waters

Elmira HistoryForge "Back in Time Post". 360 W First St Elmira

George W. Waters was a gifted world class artist from right here in Elmira, NY.

We discovered George Waters while entering data from the 1910 census. The census shows; 71 year old Artist George Waters, his wife Sarah and his two adult daughters living at 360 W First St. Art was the family occupation; his daughter Mabel was an art teacher and daughter Jean an artist.

George Waters was born in Coventry, NY in 1832. By his later teen years he moved to New York City to pursue his career as an artist. After completing his education and beginning his career as an artist, Waters looked to return to the beautiful landscapes of upstate New York. Waters and his wife Sarah moved from NYC to Elmira in 1862 to paint and raise his family.

Eight years after his arrival in Elmira George was hired as the first Director of Art for Elmira College. He retired from this position in 1903, though he continued to paint beautiful landscapes of Elmira, Pennsylvania & the Adirondacks until his death in 1912. Waters painted a rich variety of paintings within his 62 years as an artist.

Many well known Elmirans enjoyed his work, and had commissioned Waters to paint for them. Jervis Langdon owned Waters' painting named "Adirondack Lake in Autumn", and Samuel Clemens had purchased "A ship at sea engulfed in flames".

Charles Ruddick Memorial Day

Charles Ruddick

Ruddick grew up in Elmira the son of Harold and Ella Ruddick. As a student Charles attended both the SS Peter and Paul parochial school and Elmira Free Academy of which he graduated in 1914. In his time at E.F.A. Ruddick refined his musical skills in directing his class play, and was thought to have a promising business career ahead of him. After graduating he worked with his father at Ruddick and Son tailoring.

When America joined the war in Europe Charles Ruddick eagerly applied to his local recruiting office, only to be told he was underweight and would not be accepted. A few months and 5lbs later on May 2, 1918 Ruddick was finally accepted into service with the United States Marine Corps. He was sent directly to Parris Island for training, and stationed at Marine Corps Base Quantico in Virginia to await his orders overseas. In his short stay on Quantico it is unclear whether his parents were able to visit one last time before he shipped out on July 1, 1918. Pvt Charles Ruddick joined the fight in France as part of the 2nd Division 6th Marines where he earned multiple medals (no information on what these medal were) and was wounded several times. Ruddick died at the Battle of St. Mihiel in Belleau Wood September 17, 1918, less than five months after he enlisted at the local recruiting office.

Charles Ruddick was laid to rest overseas in France. We can only visit his memorial marker attached to his mother's grave stone here in Woodlawn cemetery. He is buried in the American Military Cemetery in Toul, France along with 1,260 of his fellow Americans in grave number 84. https://www.findagrave.com/.../charles-lawrence-ruddick

In 1932 Charles Ruddick's bravery was remembered when the local Marine Corps League dedicated their chapter in his name.


