


Why have a historian

Why Should Local Governments Have a Historian?

- To promote history, thus promoting community and attracting visitors and new residents.
- To help the county/city/town/village work through historic preservation issues.
- To assist in the event of a disaster
- To answer a range of questions from town officials, town residents and the public at large.



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NEW YORK STATE'S CENTURY-OLD LAW REQUIRING EVERY CITY, TOWN AND VILLAGE TO HAVE A HISTORIAN

• Approved by NYS Legislature in 1919

• Why?

- 1909 New York State celebrated the 300th anniversary of Henry Hudson's discovery of Manhattan
- 1911 State Capitol fire
- 1914-18 World War I



NYS Consolidated Laws Arts and Cultural Affairs, Article 57

S 57.07 Local historian; maintenance of historical edifices. 1. A local historian shall be appointed, as provided in this section, for each city, town or provided in this section, for each city, fown or village, except that in a city of over one million inhabitants a local historian shall be appointed for each borough therein instead of for the city at large; and a county historian may be appointed for each county. Such historian shall be appointed as follows: For a city by the mayor; for a borough, by the borough president; for a town, by the supervisor; for a village, by the mayor; for a county, by the board of supervisors...



NYS Consolidated Laws County, Article 8

S 400.

4. (a) Appointive. There shall continue to be appointed in the manner prescribed by law a clerk of the board of supervisors, a county attorney, county superintendent of highways, sealer of weighs and measures and county historian.



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Duties of the historian

S 57.07

5 57.07 1. (cont.)...Each local government historian shall promote the establishment and improvement of programs for the management and preservation of local government records with enduring value for historical or other research; encourage the coordinated collection and preservation of nongovernmental historical records by libraries, historical societies, and other repositories; and carry out and actively encourage research in such records in order to add to the knowledge, understanding and appreciation of the community's history.



New York State should have:

- 61 City Historians
- 567 Village Historians
- •938 Town Historians
- 57 County Historians
- •5 Borough Historians
- 12 Community Historians (Manhattan)
- •1 State Historian
 - 1641 Historians across the State



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- Get an Appointment letter and take an oath of office
- Make sure a Personnel file is created
- Have a job description (sample available on State Historian Website -http://www.nysm.nysed.gov/common/nysm/files /duties-functions-local-government-historians.pdf
- Meet with:
- Mayor or supervisor; board/council members
- County historian
- Contact your APHNYS Regional coordinator





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- Attend Board/Council meetings
- Establish Office hours for public
- Establish a budget
- Make sure to review the Employee handbook; Code of ethics
- Conduct an Inventory of records/materials in your office







Set up your office

- Desk and workspace
- Telephone with voicemail; call log
- Computer and printer with internet access and email
- Camera and scanner



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Set up your office

- Fireproof file cabinet and map cabinet
- Reference library
- Workspace for visitors and volunteers
- Posted office hours
- Get your New York State Library card (need to submit your appointment letter and renew every two years)




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What does a local government historian do?


- Research and writing

- Organization and advocacy






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




What a government historian is NOT

- Partisan political functionary
