
Someone in Texas Loves You


We wanted to show this sentimental note to an ill friend depicting life on "The Flats" as it was in the 1960s – read and enjoy.

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
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
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
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
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
- ➤ Write what you know—not what the market wants.


The Late Judge Charles Pumpelly Avery's Susquehanna Valley Papers Will be Republished in the Gazette.

Forty-seven years ago, the late Judge Charles P. Avery, of Owego, published, in a monthly magazine, called St. Nicholas, a series of papers on the early history of the Susquehanna Valley. Most of the information was obtained from the pioneer settlers. The matter thus obtained has been the foundation of all the early history of this county that has since been written, and had it not been written, and had it not been for Judge Avery's interest in early local history of this valley, the information then obtained would have been entirely lost. St. Nicholas was published one year, in 1853 and 1854 at the Onego Gazette office. Owing to a fire in the office, by which all copies not delivered to subscribers were burned, the volume is now so scarce that a good copy will readily fetch \$20. There are only five or six copies known to be in existence. The late Dr. D. W. Patterson, the genealogist of Newark Valley, possessed two copies, which are now in the respective libraries of two Connecticut historical societies. Dr. L. D. Farnham, of Binghamton; Miss Munger, of Owego, and the editor of this paper, each own one, and there is said to be another in Athens, Pa.

The title of Judge Avery's papers was, "The Susquehanna Valley, Gleanings from the Indian and Pioneer History." The editor of this paper has received many requests to reprint these articles in this paper, for the reason that they are now practically inaccessible to the public and that many persons would like to read and possess them. In response to these requests the first chapter of the "Susquehanna Valley" series will be printed in the next issue of the Gazette and continued each week thereafter until completed.


(Editor note: The following two paragraph of Kingman's introductory remarks, were included for completeness and to reveal the richness of Avery's magazine and Owego literary efforts. The content described was not included in the 1900 serialization of Avery's "Gleanings" and thus are not included here.)

The leading spirits in the publication of St. Nicholas were a few young business and professional men in Owego of that time. Chief of these was the late Charles A. Munger, exceptionally gifted as a poet and a writer. To the magazine he contributed a series of papers entitled "The Contemplative Angler and Lazy Man's Recreation," by "Walton Redivios." It was a satirical localization of Isaac Walton's, "Complete Angler," in a series of conversations between "Piscator" and "Venator," while fishing at various points on the Susquehanna River near Owego, at the mouth of the Little Nanticoke Creek, opposite Squaw Island, and elsewhere. (Editor note: Squaw Island is slightly downriver from Owego Creek.) Mr. Munger also contributed a serial story which ran through several numbers, entitled, "The Adventures and Experiences of Francis Felton, Written by Himself - Containing also an Account of the Life and Oddities of His Maternal Uncle, David Percival." This story was written in something of the vein of Lawrence Sterne's "Tristram Shandy." (Editor



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
David McCullough sharp skepticism. That he had been included as a consultant at this stage was taken by some as a sign that Roebling was not entirely the political innocent he was reputed to be.

William Jarvis McAlpine, of Stockbridge, Massachusetts, was the president of the American Society of Civil Engineers. Kindly, genial, widely respected, he had built the enormous dry dock at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, the Albany Water Works, and a fair number of bridges. He was also the proud possessor of what must have been the most elaborate jowl whiskers in the profession and he was the one man in the group, the two Roeblings included, who had had any firsthand experience working with compressed-air foundations, or caissons, as they were called, which, in this particular case, was regarded as an attribute of major proportions.


Probably the best-known figure among them, however, was Benjamin Henry Latrobe of Baltimore, who had the face of a bank clerk, but whose endorsement alone would perhaps have been enough to settle the whole issue. He was the son and namesake of the famous English-born architect picked by Jefferson to design or remodel much of Washington, and who rebuilt the Capitol after it was burned by the British during the War of 1812. He had laid out most of the B&O Railroad and had been in charge of building a number of exceptional bridges in Maryland and Virginia.


And finally there was John J. Serrell, the only builder of suspension bridges in the group except for the Roeblings; J. Dutton Steele, chief engineer of the Reading Railroad; and James Pugh Kirkwood, a rather mournful-looking Scotsman who was an authority on hydraulics, among other things, and who, in 1848, in northeastern Pennsylvania, had built the beautiful stone-arched Starrucca Viaduct, then the most costly railroad bridge in the world.


There is no way of knowing what thoughts passed through the minds of such men as they first looked over Roebling's drawings and listened to him talk. But it is also hard to imagine any of them remaining unimpressed for very long, for all their collective experience or their own considerable accomplishments or any professional jealousies there may have been. Nor does it seem likely that any of them failed to sense the historic nature of the moment. Roebling was the recognized giant of their profession, a lesser-Leonardo he would be called, and even on paper his bridge was clearly one of the monumental works of the age. To an engineer especially that would have been obvious.





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




Evergreen's Design: The First Maps and Early Burials ¶

Stephen Denter, who worked for the New York and Erie Railroad first came to Owego, from Ithaca, in 1836, to create a new survey of the Village. He was later commissioned to make an initial map that laid out the cemetery into squares of four lots: each with a walk on two sides of each square. The design would follow the natural



In: March: of: 1852: Stephen: Dexter: was again: employed: to: lay: out the: numbered: sections, lots, and roads in the cemetery and mark the comers of the lots and fix the location of necessary monuments based on the map he had drawn. The price was initially fixed at \$5 (quickly increased to \$10) per lot at their sale by auction.

The map above has the 1864 expansion on the upper left appended to the 1852. map. On the map, Section 8, the "Free Ground" or "Pauper's Field," was not subdivided. The Park section, center left, would later become Sections 15 and 9. ¶

The first burial recorded by Leroy Kingman in his 1907 book, Ouego, was in Section 4. Interestingly Kingman, writing more than 55 years after the burial, incorrectly names Mrs. Frank: Swift, rather: than: Mrs.: Dan: Swift, (Frances: Chase: Swift.): See: Section: 4, "First Burial" below. The Rural Cemetery Movement

Mount Aubum's opening was followed by Laurel Hill Cemetery in Philadelphia in 1836; Green Mount in Baltimore in 1838; Green-Wood Cemetery in Brooklyn, and Mount Hope Cemetery in Rochester, NY, in 1839; and ultimately Evergreen Owego in 1851 among many others. Most of Evergreen's Sections 1 through 15 are laid out in the "Rural" style with the formal entrance guarding landscaped family plots with large central monuments and often enclosures (now-removes) set within the natural contours of the landscape.
